Message from the President, Patricia Grell

We had a very good turn out for our Annual General Meeting October 25, 2006 with 30 people in attendance. There was much gratitude expressed to the previous executive for all their hard work in keeping the hall open at a critical time when revenues were very low and closing the hall seemed the only option. Somehow the executive managed to rally the community and the hall remained opened. The previous executive also must be thanked for all their hard work in taking down the old rink and setting up the new one.

We have a state of the art recreational facility thanks to them. A new executive was elected which is listed on the inside of this newsletter.

In other news, **there will be another Tri-Community Transportation meeting which will be held on Thursday, November 30 from 7-9 pm at Woodcroft Community Hall, 13915-115 Ave.** All residents are encouraged to attend this important meeting as it is a follow up to the May 15th transportation meeting where we expressed are many concerns over the changes taking place in our community in regards to transportation. Concerns ranged from the increasing traffic noise from 142 St. to the increasing numbers of buses and cut-through traffic passing through our community. It was decided at this meeting that the City would conduct another traffic survey to assess the numbers, speed and type of vehicles passing through our community. This survey was completed in September and the results will be shared at the Nov. 30th meeting.

On November 25, 10:30 am beginning at the Woodcroft Hall, there will be a “walkabout” hosted by Ian Hosler of Walkable Edmonton to look at the specific concerns around making Woodcroft more inviting for walking. We will look at the need for wheelchair accessible curb cuts — where they are needed and how many; we will consider the lighting for visibility and safety at night; we will assess the noise of traffic both from within and from without Woodcroft; and any other concerns that residents may have. Our Transportation Committee will be out in full force for the walkabout but all residents are welcome to attend and make suggestions for improvement.

Speaking of walking, **Woodcroft is attempting to start a free daytime, weekly walking club. This club will be begin with an information session at the Woodcroft Hall on Friday, November 17 from 1-2 pm.** A fitness instructor from the Running Room/Walking Room has been invited to speak on the benefits of walking as a fitness routine. At this meeting the group that has gathered will also meet to discuss the best time, date and place to meet for the walks. We may ask Westmount Mall if we could use their facility in inclement weather and poor walking conditions. For more information contact Perry Rydman at 455-7947.

PROFILE OF THE EXECUTIVE

In this new segment of the newsletter we will introduce you to a member of the executive. With a lot of new faces on the executive, it will be good that we get to know one another! The first person to be featured is Patricia Grell, new president of the Woodcroft Community League.

Patricia Grell moved to Woodcroft from Devon in June 2005 with her husband Larry Richard and 2 children William 4 and Thomas 7. Patricia has a Bachelor of Science in Psychology and a Master of Divinity and worked as a Program Coordinator prior to starting her family. She and her family moved to Woodcroft because of it's proximity to so many amenities thus allowing them to walk and cycle to parks, children's school, Peter Hemingway Rec Centre and shopping. She has a particular interest in making Woodcroft more conducive to walking and cy-



WOODCROFT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL UPDATE

Woodcroft Elementary School has been identified for a sustainability review within the next 3 years. This review on the part of the Edmonton Public School Board is part of a larger ten-year facilities review (2007-2016) of many schools within the city of Edmonton. The school board is finding that there is more space in the local schools than is needed and we don't have enough funding to operate and maintain all the space we have. Enrolment is declining in the areas with the most school space and many of the schools are in need of significant renovation. The schools currently under review are Coronation, High Park, Lendrum, Mill Creek/Ritchie, Montrose, Mount Pleasant, Mount Royal, and Newton. There are 5 benchmarks that the school board uses to determine the sustainability of a school. They are: 1. School Enrolment—there needs to be at least 140 students enrolled for an elementary school. Currently Woodcroft has 89 students enrolled. 2. Population—there needs to be more than 280 EPSB elementary students residing in the school attendance area or more than 140 EPSB elementary students residing in the school attendance area and attending the school. 3. Student Space and Cost—the amount of money per pupil the school receives must be at least 50% of what is required to fund the custodial, maintenance and utility expenses. Currently Woodcroft sits at 35%. Or the provincial utilization rate must be greater than 50%. This rate is calculated by using a formula that includes the number students currently attending the school and the square footage of the school. Woodcroft's utilization rate is 42%. 4. Facility Information and Cost—the school facility audit score, as defined by the provincial standards is rated at less than 700 points or the district's capital inspection rates the school as acceptable to excellent. 5. Location and Accessibility—there are less than 3 Edmonton Public schools where student learning space is available within a 1.6 km radius.

All the schools identified for the sustainability review could result in one or more of the following examples of outcomes: relocation of one or more programs in or out of a school; adjusting grade configuration by moving grades in or out of a school; re-designating attendance areas or alternative program boundaries; creating multi-campus sites by combining individual schools; program change; adjustment of enrolment limits; school or program closure; status quo. It should be noted that the movement of 3 or more consecutive grades entirely is considered a school closure according to the School Act.

In their 10 year Facilities Plan Report, the EPSB states that "given the national and provincial aging trend, and the higher growth rate of municipalities outside of the City of Edmonton and the district's boundaries, it is likely that the overall district enrolment numbers will continue to experience slight overall decline for the next ten years. While most of the district's schools are located in the city's older, more established areas, growth in the district's student population is anticipated to occur primarily in newer suburban neighbourhoods. Only about one-third of the district's schools are in newer areas where a large and growing number of students live... Edmonton Public Schools is a district of choice and, as such, its students have the ability to choose which schools and programs best suit their needs and interests. Currently, 51 per cent of the district's elementary students attend a school other than the one to which they have been designated. Among the district's junior high and senior high school students, 56 per cent and 50 per cent, respectively, choose to attend schools outside their designated area. The implications for Edmonton Public Schools however is that the ongoing provision of choice impacts directly on the geographic requirements for school facilities within the district and on how capital investment in schools is distributed throughout the city. Students attending schools other than the one to which they have been designated increases demands on private and public transportation (as an alternative to walking to school)."

What a difference a year makes: A Message from Laurie Hawn, MP

What a difference a year makes. In little under a year, Canada's New Government has kept its promises and has been getting results for Canadians. This fall, Canada's New Government took action on two important files for all Canadians: criminal justice reform and the environment.


For years, many Edmontonians have watched as our criminal justice system failed us. Violent and repeat offenders were often let out on our streets, often to re-offend. As part of our commitment to tackle crime, our New Government has tabled legislation that will impose stricter conditions on repeat offenders to keep such criminals from offending again and again.

The proposed legislation will put the onus on offenders convicted of a third violent or sexual offence to prove that they should not be declared dangerous offenders. Those who fail to do so will be subject to an indeterminate jail sentence, with no eligibility for parole for seven years. Coupled with other measures on conditional sentencing, street racing, and gun crimes, these measures will make all Canadians safer.


Work on the environment has also begun this session after years and years of neglect. Air quality has worsened under the previous government, and as a result, Canadians' health has suffered. Canada's New Government is different. It will tackle this problem head-on and deliver real, measurable solutions to improve air quality and address climate change.

Ours is a new approach for better results. It will move industry away from voluntary compliance to strict enforcement and replace the current patchwork system with clear and comprehensive standards. By establishing comprehensive standards, backed by regulated targets and measurable outcomes, we will improve air quality so that fewer Canadians suffer from the effects of air pollution.


On the two issues of the environment and criminal justice reform, Canada's New Government is taking measurable and real steps to make Canadians healthier and safer. I am proud of our progress to date and hope for even more results in the future. 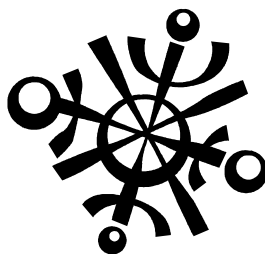

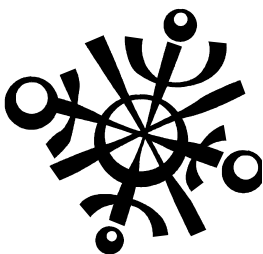

GRANT MACEWAN POOL UPDATE

College administrators decided on October 23 to invest \$1.3 million in upgrading the facility's mechanical and electrical systems keeping the pool open for another few years. During that time the administration will monitor how the new downtown YMCA pool and the refurbished Kinsmen aquatic centre affects the attendance of the MacEwan facility. The pool costs the College \$540,000 to operate each year. The upgrade will most likely begin in about 6–7 months and will take from 9–12 months to complete. Until then **our Community League's free Sunday swim from 2-5 pm will continue.**

The pool which is officially named the "Dr. Gerry Kelly Aquatic Centre" was opened in 1993.

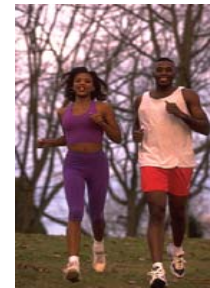

NOT IN SERVICES BUS UPDATE



ETS Manager Charles Stolte was notified recently by Patricia Grell, resident of Woodcroft, of the continued passage of not in service buses through our community. Mr. Stolte responded in an email dated October 30, 2006 that "ETS has committed to taking every available step to reduce the numbers of buses in your community to those actually in service." He mentions the steps they have taken to notify their drivers of the new initiative including posting information at the Mitchell garage, informing operators via internal communications channels and personal interviews with supervisors, and monitoring the area with ETS Inspectors. "As you are aware," he writes, "not in service buses have been using some of these roads to return to Mitchell for over 25 years, and some habits are very hard to break...In the future **should...your neighbourhood encounter not in service buses please note the date, time and bus number and e-mail me directly at charles.stolte@edmonton.ca.** I will ensure the appropriate action is taken. ETS takes your concerns seriously and is doing everything within its control to prevent these problems from reoccurring through continued information, monitoring and operator discipline (when appropriate and necessary)."

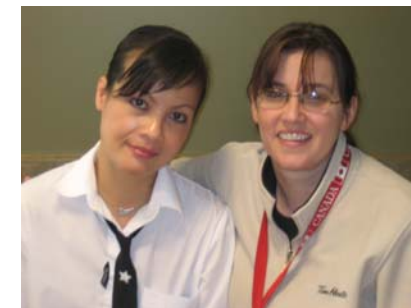


BUSINESS PROFILE: Tim Horton's at Westmount

As many of our readers may be aware, the birth place of Tim Horton's is Hamilton, Ont. A couple from Hamilton came to Edmonton and wondered at the lack of Tim Horton's out this way so decided to open up a franchise. This couple lived across the street from Marie Rudkowski and her family and shared with them their adventures in setting up a franchise in our city. The Rudkowski's of Edmonton decided to follow in their neighbour's footsteps and applied to Tim Horton's for a franchise.

After 3 years Marie, her husband and brother-in-law were granted a franchise. In the 3 years they have been in business they now own and manage a Tim Horton's location in Terwillager, 118 Ave. and 130 St., Esso on the Run at 156 St. and 111 Ave. and finally on July 1, 2006 the location at Westmount. They have 35 - 40 staff that live mostly in our area and like all businesses in this boom time, wish they could hire more.

Running a business is hard work reports Marie, but very rewarding. She says that Tim Horton's likes to offer franchises to people who have family partnerships and people of modest means. The purpose of the first requirement is to deter franchises from dissolving —family bonds are usually stronger than those between business partners. The second requirement is for the purpose of creating a connection between the owners, their staff and their customers. A millionaire owner for example, will not likely be at the franchise keeping connected with staff or customers as one who is more directly involved.

Woodcroft Community League owes a big thank you to Marie and her staff for providing the refreshments at our Annual General Meeting on October 25, 2006. Marie has agreed to continue donating refreshments for all our league meetings in the future.
